Description of Adventure Park:

Asheville Treetops Adventure Park ("ATAP") provides equipment and facilities for participants to experience adventure recreation and environmental education on a self guided tour. The Adventure Park includes unmonitored zip lines, swinging bridges, cable crossings, cable based obstacles, moving objects and structures, and other related Adventure Park activities.

Adventure Parks include multiple high cable traverses using safety harnesses and associated hardware. Participants of the Adventure Park are challenged with the difficulties of stepping off high platforms, maneuvering through difficult obstacles, monitoring contact with moving objects and changing situations, confronting a fear of heights, climbing or descending heights up to 50 feet above ground, and accepting these risks and other new challenges. Swinging bridges are walkways high in the forest canopy consisting of planking or other materials supported by steel cables and rope. Obstacles may include an incline and swinging bridge, moving platform or structure, obstructions to climb over, under, or through, ziplines, and ascension or dissension devices. Participants wear safety harnesses clipped into steel cables with attached safety lanyards. Asheville Treetops Adventure Park is a self guided experience that includes over 70 unique climbing, zipping, walking, jumping, swinging, and rappelling challenges anchored to over 30 trees and towering poles tucked in the wooded park. Park rangers are present on and around the park to assist participants toward their desired recreational and educational outcomes. All equipment will be fitted and checked by the park rangers. Park rangers will monitor participant's progress sporadically while in the park but it is the responsibility of the participant to regulate their own safety. Transfers between obstacles & challenges are the responsibility of the participant. While participating on the Adventure Park, it is the participant's responsibility to follow rules and instructions and monitor the continued fit and readiness of the harness, safety attachment equipment, and obstacles encountered. Participants must be reasonably fit and able to control their movement across the obstacles. Participants must also be able to assist themselves across a challenge or traverse before reaching any given landing platform (park rangers may verbally instruct participants with this process when they are available). The Adventure Park includes hikes on uneven terrain. Participants must be physically able to complete these tasks.

Medical Concerns: The Adventure Park is designed for participants of average mobility and strength who are in reasonably good health. Obesity, high blood pressure, cardiac and coronary artery disease, pulmonary problems, pregnancy, arthritis, tendonitis or other joint and muscular-skeletal problems may impair the safety and well-being of participants on the course, as may other medical, physical, psychological and psychiatric conditions. All such conditions may increase the inherent risks of the experience and cause the Participant to be a danger to themselves or others. Participants with medical issues must carefully consider whether such issues will prevent them from safely using the Adventure Park and decide whether to participate, or not participate, accordingly. Participants must fully inform ATAP staff in writing of all medical issues prior to entering the Adventure Park. Though the duty to determine whether a participant is in sufficient health to safely use the Adventure Park is a duty of the participant, ATAP reserves the right to exclude any applicant from using the Adventure Park for any reason.

Inherent and Other Risks: Serious injuries are uncommon on Adventure Parks, but the risk of injury or death certainly exists by reason of falls, contact with other participants or course materials, and fixed objects while the participant is moving about or being transported on the grounds on which the Adventure Park is initiated and conducted. A number of risks are inherent to the Adventure Park. These are risks that cannot be eliminated without changing the essential nature of the experience. The emotional risks range from unwelcome or inadvertent touching, simple hurt feelings to panic and psychological trauma (such as fear of heights.) The physical risks of participating range from small scrapes and bruises to bites and stings, broken bones, sprains, neurological damage and, in extraordinary cases, even death. The property on which the tour is conducted includes hilly, rocky and wooded terrain, unstable earthen banks, ravines, potentially harmful plants and animals, which may bite or sting. Injuries may be a natural consequence of the Adventure Park undertaken as a result of the environmental hazards (including terrain and weather), a result of errors in judgment or failure to exercise reasonable care by park rangers, staff or participants, or otherwise, and may occur in spite of the reasonable efforts of park rangers and staff to prevent them. In all cases, those inherent risks, as well as other risks of injury or death to persons or damage to property, which are not inherent and whether or not described above, must be accepted by those who choose to participate.
